#### Academic Retreat 2016-17




## Faculty Development Programme on Academic Excellence in the Digital Era (Webinar)

#### Topic: Faculty/ Professional Development Programme on Academic and Administrative Audit for Quality Enhancement



## FACULTY DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME NAAC: Accreditation and Ranking




## Faculty Development Programme: Green Efforts for an Eco-Friendly Campus



GST will have a far reaching impact on almost all the aspects of the business operations in the country. Industry experts call it more as a business reform rather than the Tax Reform. The Government of India seems committed to replace all the indirect taxes levied on goods and services by the center and states and implement GST by July 2017. With GST, it is anticipated that the tax base will be comprehensive, as virtually all goods and services will be taxable, with minimum exemptions. Thus it is important for Industry professionals to get acclimatized with this new regime.

- 8. Students should be able to define the meaning of a variable, and to be able to identify independent, dependent, and mediating variables.
- 9. Students should be able to define theory use in quantitative research.
- 10. Students should be able to design a good quantitative purpose statement and good quantitative research questions and hypotheses.
- 11. Students should know the steps in the process of quantitative data collection.
- 12. Students should be able to distinguish between a population and a sample.

- 13. Students should know the various types of quantitative sampling and which ones present the most rigorous approach to use.
- 14. Students should understand the link between quantitative research questions and data collection and how research questions are operationalized in educational practice.
- 15. Students should be familiar with the steps involved in identifying and selecting a good instrument to use in a study




- Topic: Efficient Use of Technology in Administration


#### • Topic: Training on Cash Book Maintenance and Fund Utilization



For the purpose of this agreement, the term "Waste Management Services" is the services that are provided by contractor (M/s.Micro Hard Systems, Muvattupuzha) as directed by HBC, and including the handling. The rates as agreed between both the parties will be applicable.



- 1. TIES will make the arrangements and provide sufficient help for getting legal permissions and other official permissions required for community linked activities such as sample collection, studies inside the forest areas, visit to government institutions, *etc*.
- J. TIES will not be responsible for any loss incurred to the participants due to unforeseen reasons beyond our control.
- K. No financial support will be provided by TIES in conducting CNPI projects and programmes.
- L. The services offered by TIES under CNPI are chargeable and the same should be agreed by both parties and given in Annexure I. But the expenses towards laboratory experiments, printing and publication expenses, food expenses (during seminar/ workshop *etc.*) etc. if any, should be borne by the college.

### II. Henry Baker College agrees that:

A. College will be responsible for organising all programmes and projects under CNPI as per pre-agreed time schedule. Timely conduct of programmes and implementation of project is the sole responsibility of the college.





- B. College shall identify and select the faculty members and students to work with CNPI for every academic year. Three to ten teachers and 75 to 150 students should be part of the CNPI. The rest of the students and faculty in the college shall be facultative participants. But all should be the beneficiaries of the CNPI.
- C. College shall provide its laboratory or other infrastructure facilities for the conduct of projects/programmes under CNPI.
- D. College shall make arrangements for regular monitoring and documentation of the programmes/projects under CNPI. This will be used for the final report publication.
- E. The organising expenses of various projects and programmes under CNPI will be borne by the college.
- F. College shall pay the consultation fee for TIES as per the schedule given in Annexure I.

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### III Conditions of the Agreement

- A. This agreement will become effective upon signing by the designated representatives from both institutions for a period of one year (Or the period agreed by the parties).
- B. Any alteration of the provisions of this agreement will become effective only upon the mutual written consent of both institutions.
- C. This agreement is valid from the midnight of <> to the midnight of <> Indian Standard Time or it may be terminated upon the request of either parties made at least one month prior to the proposed termination date.



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

Both parties assume that this agreement does not go against the rules and regulations of the Government policies.



As per the MOU MES College Marampally team has visited the college, gave guidance and additional services on various occasions.






## Second party agrees:

- b) It shall (a) conduct business in conformance with sound ethical standards of integrity and honesty; (b) conduct business in such a way as to not give the appearance of impropriety, even when the behavior or activity is in compliance with the law; (c) not achieve business results by illegal acts or unethical conduct; (d) prohibit Second Party's Support Staff and other employees, agents and subcontractors from offering, paying or authorizing financial, and/or any other item of value or other advantage to be given to any official or employee of any poverament or political party, political candidates, employees of government enterprises or any other person or entity, with knowledge or a reason to believe that such payment or promise to pay will be made to any government official (each, an Official) to take, or not to take, any action or decision; or (iii) inducing such Official to this agreement the influence to affect any action or decision; or (iii) 21. Except as provided in this agreement the influence to affect any act or decision of a government 21. Except as provided in this agreement the influence to affect any act or decision of a government
- 21. Except as provided in this agreement the initial term of the SECOND PARTY's association with the FIRST PARTY shall be for a period of one year initially from the date of commencement of this agreement which shall be the date of signing of this agreement by the parties.
- 22. The title conferred vide this agreement is not transferable to any third party, individual or otherwise other than legal heirs for which a transfer of title has to be executed with adequate reasons for transfer.
- 23. The agreement shall get lapsed at the end of the first year and at the option of the parties and the agreement may be renewed for mother term as mutually agreed upon by the parties. If in any case any of the parties don't want the agreement to be renewed, the same muy be communicated in writing 30 days in advance to the date of renewal.
- 24. The FIRST PARTY reserves the right to terminate this agreement at their option if they are convinced that the SECOND PARTY has violated the purview of this agreement at any point of time with a prior written notice stating the points of violation thirty days in advance and vice versa.
  25. The expenses incurred if any in case of termination shall be home by the party who is at fault.

#### DISPUTE RESOLUTION:

- 26. If any dispute arises between the PARTIES here to during the subsistence of this 'Memorandum' or thereafter, in connection with the validity, interpretation, implementation or alleged material breach of any provision of this 'Memorandum', the PARTIES hereto shall endeavor to settle such dispute aminably. In the case of failure by the PARTIES to resolve the dispute in the manner set out above within 15 (fiftuen) days from the date when the dispute arose, the dispute shall be referred to arbitration of a Sole Arbitrator to be appointed by the SECOND PARTY. The place of arbitration shall be Ernskulam.
- 27. The arbitration proceeding shall be governed by the Arbitration and Conciliation Act, 1996 and shall be in the English language. The Arbitrator shall also decide on the costs of the arbitration proceedings.
- 28. The Arbitrator's award shall be substantiated in writing and the PARTIES bereto shall submit to the Arbitrator's award which shall be enforceable in any competent court of law.

Henry Baker Junior. It is a covenant made between both Institutions for educational partnership and cooperation.

Prime Objectives:

- To witness the loving presence of God which Rev. Henry Baker(Jr.)from Kirby has demonstrated to the people of Melukavu and adjoining places.
- To enhance the English speaking and communicative skills of the students through service of volunteers sent from Kirby.
- To provide exposure to the Indian life and culture to the volunteers from Kirby.

During the Academic Year 2013 -14, Mr. Felix Austin, the first volunteer tutor from Bridge hall joined the college on I June2013. He had taken communication English training class for the students. - 2. Certificate Course in Communicative English



Dr. Jochen Waldorf, School Pastor.








- Arrange mutually agreed programs in cooperation to both institutions
